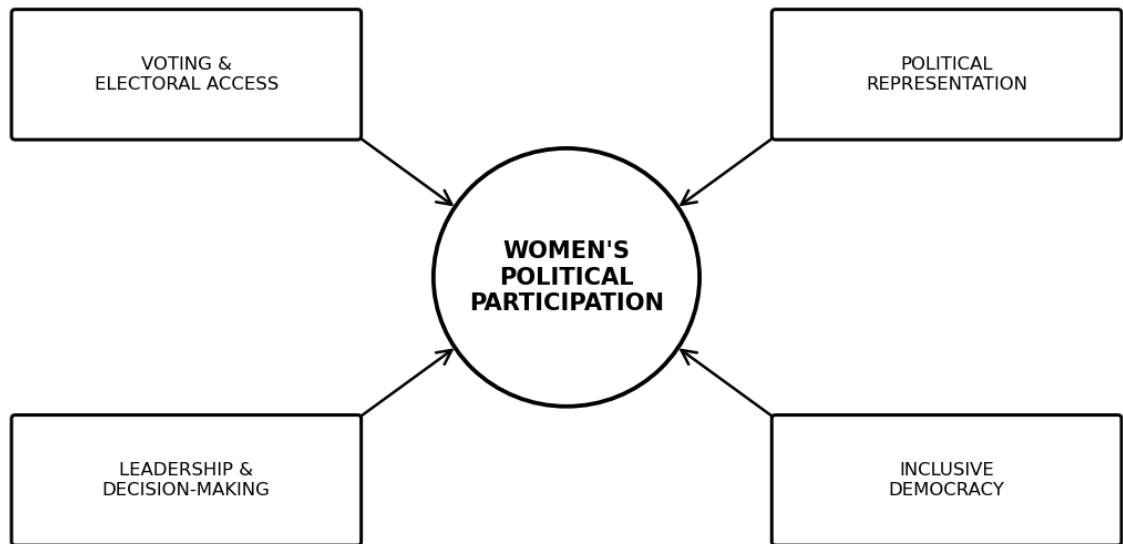


Figure 1. Simplified overview of women's political participation and democratic development.
